******An update about my Dad. I went up to Oregon in November, in the middle of selling our house and buying a new condo, and met with representatives from the Bend and Klamath Falls Sheriffs' Departments and members of the local Search and Rescue crew. We had a long meeting about how my father might have flown around Klamath Lake on his way home to Reno from Sunriver, Oregon. He liked to fly low and buzz some relatives who live on the southwest side of the Lake not too far from where his shoe and foot was found washed up on a county park beach. The authorities are going to start a search in the area that George and I suggested. However, with the lake so low and now with the snow and bad weather, probably no real work will be undertaken until the spring.

While I was in Klamath Falls, I got to visit with several cousins and other relatives who remember my father very fondly. It was the first time I had seen them since 1985. It is actually quite heartwarming to me to think that Dad went down in the lake rather than in the Sierras as we had believed before. My brother had installed a memorial for Dad near where his mother (our grandmother) was buried in Klamath Falls a few years after he disappeared, even though we had no thought that he might have gone down there. Now it seems very serendipitous.

From Marylaid Wood

In September a Hindu friend told me she was attending her niece's wedding in November, and I asked myself along. It was an arranged marriage. The couple met in August and the astrologers said the most auspicious time for marrying was 4 a.m November 24. It was a mad rush as my passport was expiring and the Indian visa process is complicated. And I needed some summer clothes for the 81 degree weather.

My friend's family rented a condo for 5 of us in their complex which was older walkup buildings with a courtyard in the center. Each unit was painted a different color and each entry door was unique, often ornamented.

My friend's sister is a teacher and her husband is an insurance salesman, but although their jobs are middle class, the standard living is lower than middle class here.

Although the toilets were modern flush, most were were outside the units and didn't take paper. The water comes on for two hours twice a day. There are no showers or tubs. A few people have washing machines but mostly washing is done by hand and hung outside to dry.

In this older part of Delhi life is centered around the courtyard. At 5 a.m. everyday a group of women came out, sat in the courtyard and chanted for an hour, accompanied by drummer and bells.

Most people didn't have cars; they parked motorcycles parked in the courtyard under the hanging laundry. The children play there with no fear of kidnapping. The cows have been blocked from entering but the dogs run loose. Every day a vegetable seller came to call out his wares and once a magician did a few tricks. Although English is taught in the schools, like most of us, people have forgotten it unless they work with foreigners. But I was able to make contact with smiles, photographs, dancing at ceremonies and playing peek-a boo with the children with my large hat.

The homes I visited had shrines with flowers, pictures of gods or holy men, and fruit for the gods. (It's ok to eat the fruit after it's dedicated.) There were three religious holidays during the 2 1/2 weeks I was there, and the women held ceremonies in the courtyard. My favorite was when about 50 of us paraded around the neighborhood with two drummers and stopped to dance every 100 yards or so and then lunch.





Lake Merritt History

In 1869, Dr. Samuel Merritt donated 155 acres of dammed tidal water from the headwaters of Indian Slough, it became known as "Merritt's Lake" and later as Lake Merritt. In 1925, Lake Merritt's Necklace of Lights is lit for the first time during the Dons of Peralta Water Festival. There are 126 lampposts, each given by an organization or an individual.

The lampposts and 3,400 pearly bulbs shine until 1941 when World War II blackout conditions are enforced.

Sometimes called the Jewel of Oakland, Oakland is the only city in the United States with a salt water lake in the downtown metropolitan area. Originally part of the San Francisco bay, in 1869, Oakland Mayor Dr. Samuel Merritt donated money to build a dam at the 12th Street bridge, across the "neck" of the inlet, thus creating the present day lake.

America's Oldest Wildlife

RefugeLake Merritt originally resided as a wide, tidal estuary (salt water marsh) that was known as the Laguna Peralta. The Pacific Flyway has remained a sanctuary and stop-over for thousands of migratory birds.



Dr. Merritt declared the lake a National Wildlife Refuge in 1869. On March 18th, 1870 the statue of California was approved and Lake Merritt became the first protected wildlife refuge in America. A dam was proposed to regulate the tidal water flow, to increase the water level, with a retaining wall.

In 1915, organized feedings of the wild ducks began and ten years later the first bird island was constructed, with an additional four islands added in 1956. These are the largest of the artifical islands that house hundreds of egrets, herons, Canada geese and many other species of birds. Two of the islands are equipped with fresh water ponds. To ensure that marine sports and boating activities based at Lake Merritt aren't disruptive to the birds, a boom cordons off the five islands during nesting season.

## **52walks No. 50: Oakmore Steps**

The view back down the Bridgeview Steps, which help make the Oakmore Highlands pedestrian-friendly.

After Leimert Boulevard crosses Dimond Canyon, it enters a neighborhood of twisty little streets climbing the hills. The Oakmore Highlands, developed in the 1920s, were designed to offer homeowners spectacular views but convenient pedestrian access to the streetcar line that ran across the Leimert bridge. Four stairways offer these links and make for a short but steep route with some panoramic vistas across the city.

Start at the small commercial area on Leimert and walk up Arden Place. A green sign tells you when you've reached a public stairway. The first set of steps is utilitarian and short, but after crossing Bridgeview Drive, you begin a more serious climb up past steeply terraced yards. The neighbors have made an effort to make the stairs welcoming, with the occasional geranium or seasonal decoration marking their gates.

The third set of stairs offers the best view of Oakland.

At the top of this second stair, you find Leimert Boulevard again. Turn and appreciate the view; a sliver of downtown Oakland and the port can be seen through a keyhole in the trees. Turn right on Leimert and look for the next public stair sign, which will be on your left around the sharp curve in the street.

This third set of steps is wooden, with a rustic feel. Be sure to look back again at the top for a panorama of Oakland and the San Francisco hills across the bay. Then turn right on Oakview Drive and walk to the end of the court. The final set of steps descends to your right beneath a heavy canopy of trees. Turning right on Hoover at the bottom of the steps, you have an easy walk downhill to Leimert.

Most of the homes in the Oakmore Highlands neighborhood are in the Mediterranean style, but some have fantastic details — ornate ironwork or Hobbit-style arches over their gates; Storybook touches like portholes in the brickwork.

It's worth noting that as recently as 10 years ago, these steps were in such bad disrepair, they could hardly be used. The neighborhood took up their cause and persuaded the city to repair them in 2004.

Getting there: The closest bus service is to Park Boulevard, a short walk along Leimert Boulevard to Arden Place. Metered parking is available in the small neighborhood commercial area around Leimert and Arden.

Cool stuff in the neighborhood: Red Boy Pizza and Thai Bistro, at the corner of Arden Place and Leimert Boulevard, offer sit-down dining. Rocky's Market, near the Leimert bridge, has cold drinks and a small selection of groceries.
